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
Geography

Location

Ogallala, the middle of everywhere! You can't beat location and Keith County has one of the best. Ogallala is the county seat of Keith County. Located right on Interstate 80, just 20 minutes from the Interstate 76 Junction and with ease of access to Highways 61, 26 and 30, you can truly go anyway from here. Ogallala is 212 miles east of Denver, CO; 275 miles west of Lincoln, NE; and 330 miles west of Omaha, NE. The South Platte River flows through town and the North Platte River flows through Lake McConaughy, located 9 miles north of Ogallala

Elevation

Ogallala is 3,222 feet above sea level, with a gentle slope to the east.





Economic Development

Ogallala was recertified as an Economic Development Certified Community in 2016, which indicates that a community is ready to respond to any prospect inquiries and has the necessary tools available to take action in assisting with a site location decision.

Firms with retail sales tax permits in Ogallala reported 2018 net taxable retail sales of \$98,046,859, while Keith County reported retail sales of \$108,643,438.









Economic Development Organizations

Keith County Area Development, the City of Ogallala, Ogallala/Keith County Chamber of Commerce, and the Community Redevelopment Authority work together for industrial development in the community.

Keith County Area Development (KCAD), with nine board members, is a public/private partnership funded by membership dues and city and county governments. The mission of KCAD is to lead activities and partner with community members to broaden and strengthen employment and commerce in Keith County.

Keith County Area Development purchased the Ogallala North Business Park in 2002 and has since located five businesses there with approximately 80 acres still available for commercial and industrial development. The sites are easily accessible via U.S. Highways 26 and 61 and Interstate 80 is two miles south. KCAD works closely with the Community Redevelopment Authority to promote development south of Interstate 80 near Ogallala.

Approximately 31 acres in and adjacent to Ogallala are zoned for commercial or industrial purposes. Land prices range from \$10,000 to \$28,000 per acre.







Fringe Benefits

Based on present experience of existing local industry, on the average, workers are granted eight paid holidays and one to two weeks vacation annually. Fifty to 65 percent of the premiums for group life, accidental

and sickness, and hospitalization and medical-surgical insurance are paid by industries. Industrial pension plans, stock sharing plans, and profit sharing year-end bonuses are also available.

Highways

Ogallala is in the western part of Nebraska, just outside the southeast portion of the panhandle. Located along I-80, Ogallala is 212 miles from Denver, CO, 275 miles from Lincoln, and 330 miles to Omaha. Interstate 76 is just 26 miles west, and U.S. Highway 30, U.S. Highway 26, and Nebraska Highway 61 all intersect in Ogallala. Union Pacific Railroad has a line through Ogallala and BNSF also serves the area. The South Platte River flows through town and the North Platte River flows through Lake McConaughy, located 9 miles north.

More than 13,500 licensed motor carriers with world-wide connections are based in Nebraska and serve businesses throughout North America.

There are several one and two truck companies for hire in Ogallala and the surrounding area.

Bus Lines

Greyhound serves Ogallala with bus service to Denver, Colorado and Omaha, Nebraska. Ogallala Public Transit provides door to door service in an area up to a one mile radius outside the Ogallala city limits.

Rail

Ogallala is served by a main line of the Union Pacific Railroad. Nearby North Platte is home to the world's largest rail yard and

Amtrak provides McCook, 118 miles southeast of Ogallala, with rail passenger service throughout the United States. Additional Nebraska Amtrak stations are located in Hastings, Holdrege, Lincoln, and Omaha. For more information, visit www.amtrak.com.

Air

Searle Field, the municipal air field, is located two miles west of Ogallala. The airport has two paved and lighted runways (5,102 feet and 3,700 feet). Other facilities include pilot's lounge, hangars, computer, weather, 24-hour/7-day access by code, and self-serve 100 low-lead and jet A fuel. Twenty planes are hangared there. A full-service mechanic is available. The elevation at the airport is 3,276 feet, the latitude is 41-07N, and the longitude is 101-46W. Great Lakes Aviation has three flights daily to the Denver International Airport.

Infrastructure Nebraska Highlights

Energy costs are a considerable part of any business' operational budget. These costs can vary greatly between states, but in Nebraska (the only state in the nation where all electric utilities are publicly owned) electric costs are passed to consumers at low, cost-of-service rates. As a result, industrial rates are well below the national average. Nebraska's electric utilities can offer low rates, in part, because they draw from an efficient "mix" of generation resources including coal, natural gas, oil, diesel, and methane, along with carbon-free "fuels," like nuclear, wind, hydro, and solar power.


Nebraska Public Power District (NPPD) is the state's largest electric generating utility in terms of chartered territory, which includes all or parts of 86 of Nebraska's 93 counties. NPPD relies upon nine major generating facilities, more than 5,000 miles of high-voltage power lines, approximately 260 substations, and thousands more miles of distribution lines. Because the system is interconnected to electrical grids in other states, NPPD works with regional utilities and industry entities to ensure power is delivered safely and dependably to Nebraskans.

NPPD has an Economic Development Rate (EDR) for customers with qualifying projects of new or additional electric load. To be eligible for the lower, incentivized EDR, a customer must:

- be served by an NPPD wholesale customer or NPPD's Retail Division.
- add new or additional electric load of at least one megawatt,
- have a minimum monthly load factor of 60 percent,

- have a written agreement with the State of Nebraska or any political subdivision to provide an economic development project pursuant to state or local law, and
- have a written service agreement with NPPD.

NPPD's renewable resources play a central role in a strong carbon-free footprint. In addition to a power purchase agreement with seven of the state's wind farms, NPPD owns and operates the largest public power wind facility in the state near Ainsworth.

NPPD has three hydropower facilities and contracts for generation from three other hydropower facilities. Community solar is also underway in three communities, with more on the way. In 2016, NPPD's Cooper Nuclear Station contributed to an energy portfolio that was more than 60 percent carbon-free.

Natural gas in Nebraska is also attractive to industry for service, supply, and price. A gas-producing state, Nebraska is close and well-connected by pipeline to the major gas fields of the central and southern plains. The state's average cost of industrial gas is less than both the regional and national averages.

The pipelines of two major companies, Northern Natural Gas and Kinder Morgan, provide an ample supply of natural gas to most areas of Nebraska. Depending on usage requirements, natural gas is offered both on a "firm" and "interruptible" basis.

Ogallala Utilities

Electricity

Ogallala is provided retail electric service by Nebraska Public Power District (NPPD). Service is supplied by two transmission systems, 230 kV and 115 kV. Ogallala has two incoming feeds at 34.5 kV connecting all four distribution substations for redundancy. Total capacity of the community's substations is more than 30 MW. Distribution voltages for the community are 7.2 kV and 2.4 kV.

Base Electric Rates (effective 1/1/19)

Summer bills run from June–September. **Winter bills** run from October–May.

Customers who are served from distribution facilities for which NPPD has a Lease Payment or Debt Service obligation and/or a Gross Revenue Tax obligation will have the Base Rate adjusted to include such obligations.

Natural Gas

A subsidiary of Black Hills Corporation, Black Hills Energy (BHE), serves 300,000 natural gas customers in 300 Nebraska communities, including Ogallala. Ogallala is served by a 6-inch steel line. Black Hills Energy's Nebraska headquarters is located in Lincoln.

Black Hills Energy is a full-service natural gas distributor in Ogallala. The transmission provider is Tallgrass Energy. Natural gas, with an average value of 1,000 BTU per cubic foot, is available for residential, commercial, and industrial customers for base and peak use on a firm basis. Interruptible service is available for customers with an alternate fuel capability.

Rates vary slightly due to season and commodity price fluctuations. Contact Black Hills Energy at (800) 232-1850 for information regarding gas rates and service.

Water

Eight wells supply the municipal water system, which have an average depth of 328 feet. The system, serving the entire city, has a combined pumping sustainable capacity of 4,225 gallons per minute and an overhead storage capacity of 1,400,000 gallons. The average daily demand is 1,000,000 gallons, and the historic peak daily demand is 3,500,000 gallons. The system has a maximum capacity of 7,484,000 sustainable gallons per day. The static pressure is 35 pounds per square inch and the residual pressure is 100 pounds per square inch. The water table fluctuates seasonally and chlorination is added to the water throughout the summer. The quality of water in Ogallala does not necessitate a water treatment plant.

Water Rates (effective 10/1/16)

The tapping fee consists of the cost of materials, plus labor (minimum of two hours), and expenses charged for all new water services. A \$75.00 deposit fee is charged for residential, commercial, and industrial services and an activation fee of \$25.00 is charged on all new accounts.

Sewerage

Ogallala has a municipal sanitary sewer system and a storm sewer system. The filter/activated sludge treatment plant was updated to a UV Disinfection in 2011 and has a daily capacity of 1,200,000 gallons and an average daily flow of 500,000 gallons.

Sewer-Use Charges (effective 10/1/16)

The tapping fee consists of the cost of materials, plus labor (minimum of two hours), and charged for all new water services. A \$75.00 deposit fee is charged for residential, commercial, and industrial services and an activation fee of \$25.00 is charged on all new accounts.

Tax Structure

Nebraska Highlights

- Nebraska assesses income tax based upon the amount of federal taxable income
- No state property tax
- No inventory tax
- No sales tax on:
 - raw materials when used as ingredients or component parts in manufacturing operations
 - sales of energy for processing or manufacturing purposes
 - water used exclusively in manufacturing and processing
 - o qualified agricultural machinery and equipment
 - manufacturing machinery, equipment, and related services
- Sales and use tax refunds are available on qualifying air and water pollution control equipment
- Sales and use tax refunds are available on property qualifying for certain investment incentives

The Nebraska State Government is financed by an individual income tax, corporate income tax, 5.5 percent sales and use tax, corporate occupation tax, and selective excise taxes (liquor, tobacco, motor fuels, etc.). Local governments are financed primarily by property taxes, although some cities and counties collect a local option sales tax of between 0.5 and 2.0 percent.

Property taxes are levied against real and personal property by local political subdivisions such as counties, cities, school districts, fire districts, etc., to provide for local services. All real property except agricultural land is assessed at actual or market value. Agricultural land is assessed at 75 percent of actual value. Personal property is assessed at net book value. Tax rates are expressed in dollars and cents for each \$100 of actual value.




- Comparison with sales of real property of known or recognized value, taking into account location, zoning, current functional use, and other statutory guidelines (sales comparison approach)

- Cost less depreciation (cost approach)

Local Government

Ogallala, a first-class city, has a council-manager form of government. Council members are elected by popular vote for four-year terms. The 2019–20 actual budget was \$17,260,828.

Keith County has five districts and is governed by five county commissioners, who are elected by popular vote for four-year terms. The actual county budget for 2017–18 was \$17,396,419. The county belongs to Keith County Area Development and West Central Nebraska Development District along with 18 other counties.

Fire Protection

Fire protection is provided to the city by a 34-member volunteer fire department; 30 members are certified emergency medical technicians and 4 are paramedics. The Ogallala Volunteer Fire Department responds to structural fires, wildland fires, vehicle accidents, water rescue, and emergency medical calls in a 458-square mile area.

Ogallala has one fire station and 337 fire hydrants. The fire insurance classification inside the corporate limits is four; outside it is 4–9. Annual expenditures for fire protection for the past three years averaged \$239,386.

Streets

Ogallala has 53.58 miles of streets; 43.56 miles are hard-surfaced streets with 21.32 miles in concrete and 22.24 miles in asphalt. Restrictions on oversized loads are enforced on North Spruce Street. Eighty percent of the streets have curbs and sidewalks.

The 2009 edition of the International Building Code has been adopted by the City of Ogallala.

Law Enforcement

The Ogallala Police Department employs ten full-time police officers and one support person. The patrol division equipment consists of standard equipment, four digital speed signs in key locations, a covert speed measuring device, and body cams. Annual expenditures for police protection for the last three years averaged \$1,088,961. Regular patrol by the police department provides protection to existing industries in the area.

Ogallala Community Hospital—Banner Health, built in 2000, is licensed for 18 care beds and ranked Top 100 in Critical Access. It is owned by Keith County Hospital Authority Board, it offers a full range acute and primary medical care services to the rural communities of west-central Nebraska. General and orthopedic surgeons are on staff along with services such as cancer, emergency, endoscopy, eye, family medicine, heart, imaging, infusion therapy, intensive care, lab, maternity, orthopedics, pulmonary and asthma, rehabilitation, sleep medicine, sports medicine, surgery, wellness, and women's health.

Banner Health Clinic, attached to the hospital, is an on-site clinic, as well as a specialty clinic offering a wide range of visiting specialties including heart care; cancer care; urology; ophthalmology; gastroenterology; oncology; bariatrics surgery; OB/GYN; pain; dermatology; and ear, nose, and throat.

Family Medical Center is a locally owned clinic with one medical doctor, two physician assistants, two medical assistants, and one licensed practical nurse on staff. Established in 1988, Family Medical Center provides family care in Ogallala.

Rescue Squad

The full-time service covers the day-time staffing service while the volunteer service in command in the evening hours. Recreation

There are eight parks covering 25 acres – six of them have playground equipment. Collister Park has playground equipment, advanced athletic surface multi-sport court and an indoor recreation center. Williams Park has playground equipment, a community garden, walking path, and disc golf course. Searle Park has an outdoor swimming pool, playground equipment, tennis courts, baseball field, and walking path. Western Diamonds Park has playground equipment, baseball/softball fields, soccer fields, and a walking path.

Summer recreation programs in Ogallala include soccer, softball, baseball, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, swimming, golf, dance, basketball, volleyball and gymnastics. Other recreation programs include soap box derbies. Many enjoy hunting and fishing in the area. The Wild West Soap Box Derby Track is a unique recreational activity offered in Ogallala. The Soap Box Derby® is an international nonprofit organization whose mission is to build knowledge and character, create meaningful experiences through collaboration, and fair and honest competition.

The **Goodall Recreation Center**, a premier fitness center, has an indoor pool, hot tub, sauna, indoor track, weight-lifting machines, free weights, locker rooms, and an indoor half basketball court. Lifeguards and qualified personal trainers are available to answer questions and help with orientation at the facility.

An authentic Victorian style home, **Mansion on the Hill** was Ogallala's finest residence when it was completed in 1887. Today, it is listed in the National Register of Historic Places and is a favorite with visitors to Ogallala.

Boot Hill is a cowboy cemetery located in Ogallala. Most cowboys from the 1880s Texas Trail era were buried with their boots on, thus the name Boot Hill. Boot Hill is unique—buried in its sod are the many stories of the early days of Ogallala.

Front Street is a replica of an old west town located on Highway 30, just northeast of the I-80 interchange. Visitors can go to the general store, restaurant, bar and free museum. Crystal Palace Revue entertains every summer with a western theater production including a shootout.

The **Petrified Wood Gallery**, located in Ogallala, is a unique collection of ancient woods, fossils, gemstones, and Native American arrow heads and artifacts.

Built in 1922, the **Spruce Street Station** (see front cover image) in Ogallala, is considered one of the best preserved of fewer than 20 former Standard Oil Stations still standing. Once the state's largest marketer of petroleum products, Standard Oil of Nebraska rose to prominence with the advent of the automobile.

Lake McConaughy (Lake Mac) is the largest lake in Nebraska and is the number one tourist destination in western Nebraska. Located eight miles north of Ogallala, it provides more than 75 miles of sandy beaches, boating and recreation. Keith County is ranked number three in the nation for best bird watching destinations. Lake Mac is a great place to watch spring and fall migrations.

Keith County Senior Center, located in Ogallala, provides a variety of services that are available to Keith County area residents. These services include congregate meals/nutrition sites and home delivery meals for the elderly in the community.

With 800-plus varieties of lilacs, **Lilacs of Meadowlark Hill** is one of the largest private collections in the world. It is open to the public part of May, every year.

Tri-trails Park commemorates three historic trails that pass through Keith County during the 1800s. Visitors enjoy the view where the Oregon Trail, Pony Express Trail and the Great Western Cattle Trail would have intersected.

Ash Hollow State Historical Park is the famous stopping point along the Oregon and California Trail. It is part of the state park and visitor center northwest of Ogallala.

Listed on the National Register for Historic Places, Little Church of Keystone is a true display of the pioneer spirit and religious harmony. The church has both Catholic altar and Protestant altar to meet the needs of the new community. Pew backs flip to face the appropriate altar

The **Walk of Fame** includes a tour of the Great Platte River Road, End of the Texas Trail, Pony Express, Mormon Trail, Union Pacific Railroad, Highway 26 & 92 and Lincoln Highway (Highway 30).

Agriculture & Raw Materials

In 2017 Nebraska ranked first among the states in beef and veal exports; third in corn exports and cash receipts from all livestock and products. Nebraska's farms and ranches utilized 45.2 million acres or 91 percent of the state's total land area. Cash receipts from farm markets in 2017 contributed more than \$21.0 billion to the state's economy and 5.7 percent of the U.S. total. Food processing is the state's largest manufacturing sector and foreign markets are important for many of the state's manufacturers.

The **Ogallala Aguifer** underlies 174,000 square miles in parts of eight states. The Ogallala Aquifer within Nebraska contains approximately 65 percent of the water in storage in the entire aquifer. With the implementation of more efficient irrigation systems and other water management measures, the Ogallala Aguifer will remain a valuable resource in Nebraska.

Nebraska's Natural Resource Districts (NRDs) have responsibility for managing groundwater resources. The Nebraska Department of Natural Resources maintains responsibility for administration of surface water rights. In locations where groundwater and surface water are connected, the responsibility is shared among the NRDs and the state for achieving a sustainable balance between water supplies and water use.

Nebraskans enjoy four distinct seasons... spring, summer, fall, and winter

Nebraska has a continental climate, with hot summers and cold winters. Temperatures are highly variable from season to season and year to year. The majority of the state has an average annual maximum temperature of 60°F to 65°F with average annual minimum temperatures in the 30°F to 40°F range. State temperature records are -47°F and 118°F. The average number of days in excess of 100°F range from 5 (northeast) to 11 (southwest) with most of the state between 6 and 9 days. Minimum temperatures below zero occur on average 7 days per year in southeast Nebraska to 20 days in north-central Nebraska.


Precipitation

Precipitation is also variable and ranges from an annual average of 15 to 20 inches in the west to 30 to 35 inches in southeast Nebraska. Approximately 75 percent of the precipitation falls as rain from April to September. Annual average snowfall ranges from 20 inches in the southeast to 50 inches in the northwest. Snowfall usually increases during late winter and reaches a maximum in March.


Growing Season

The growing season fluctuates in length, but on average it ranges from 120 days in the extreme northwest to 170 days in the southeast. The average date of the last freeze in spring varies from April 25 in extreme southeast Nebraska to May 21 in extreme northwest. The first fall freeze typically occurs from September 20 in the extreme northwest to October 6 in the southeast part of the state.


Annual Minimum Temperature (F)


